I transmit to the House of Representatives a report from the Secretary of War, conveying the information called for by the House in its resolution of yesterday, concerning the Cherokee treaty recently ratified.

# WAR DEPARTMENT, June 28, 1836.

SIR: In conformity with a resolution of the House of Representatives of yesterday, I have the honor to submit to you copies of the document in relation to the Cherokee treaty, lately ratified, which were communicated to the Senate, and which contain the information called for by the House.

It being your desire that those documents should be sent this morning, I have been compelled to transmit a copy of them printed by order of the Senate. To have transcribed from the originals would have delayed the answer, and prevented the information from reaching the House afficially in time perhaps for its consideration.
