The appropriations for the service of the year 1842, made by former acts of Congress, including arming and equipping the militia, civilization of Indians, revolutionary claims, revolutionary pensions under the act of June 7, 1832, claims of the State of Virginia, unclaimed pensions, relief of the several corporate cities in the District of Columbia, and public debt 1,572,900 00 -2. 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


