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### CIVIL AND DIPLOMATIC APPROPRIATIONS OF 1842.

[To accompany bill H. R. No. 74.]

JANUARY 25, 1842.

Committed, with the bill, to the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union.

The Committee of Ways and Means beg leave to state, in reporting the bill making appropriations for the civil and diplomatic expenses of Government for the year eighteen hundred and forty-two, that they have gone into a laborious investigation of the items of said bill, and a thorough examination of the legal authorities upon which the appropriations are based, with an anxious desire to limit the appropriations, as far as practicable, to those authorized by law. To effect this object, they have been compelled to consult authorities so numerous, not to say sometimes obscure and contradictory, that they cannot flatter themselves that they may not have committe some errors. They have, however, felt it to be their duty to lay befor the House references to these authorities, that every member might amine for himself, in the hope that it may facilitate the progress of the through the House, detect any errors that may have escaped the scrut of the committee, and furnish in time to come a convenient reference these authorities, and thereby greatly expedite the labors of future conmittees.

The committee have found, in the course of this investigation, that mappropriations have heretofore been made without authority of law to series of years; and, with a view of legitimating so many of these as must be deemed necessary, they will report a separate bill, under the resolution of the House of the 6th January, and the committee thought they would probably be legalized, they have retained them in the bill, to save the necessity of reporting another bill on this subject.

The amount reported in this bill, in pursuance of former appropriations, which it is supposed Congress will legitimate, is \$82,216 11.

The amount which the committee have deducted from the estimates is \$303,164 47.

And the amount appropriated by the bill is \$7,669,073 38.

With these explanations, the committee submit the following references and brief explanations of the several items of the bill, the numbers in the report and bill corresponding with each other.
