GENERAL LAND OFFICE, January 6, 1843.

Sir: I have the honor to enclose a table, marked A, exhibiting the sales of land in the Chickasaw cession, from the commencement to the latest returns of sales, (November 30, 1842,) together with certain abstracts, forming document B, which show all the expenditures on account of surveys in the cession.

CHICKASAW AGENCY, September 16, 1845.

Sin: Agreeable to your order, I herewith forward to you a statement of funds that have been disbursed by me, belonging to the Chickasaw fund.

I received of Major Armstrong, the superintendent, in July, 1841, five thousand dollars to pay the blacksmiths that were employed for the benefit of the Chickasaws, all of which was paid in 1841. I received four thousand dollars for the same purpose in 1843, which was paid so soon as I received it. In 1845, I received nine thousand and thirteen dollars and twenty-eight cents, for the purpose of paying for iron, steel, coal, and the blacksmiths, and assistant blacksmiths, which was paid out and accounted for in the month of June last.

In October, 1840, I received of the superintendent, Major Armstrong, twenty-eight thousand nine hundred and forty-one dollars and twenty-three cents, (\$28,941 23,) being the interest on the incompetent fund for eighteen months, all of which has been accounted for agreeable to the regulations.

I received from the superintendent, Major Armstrong, in November, 1844, sixty thousand dollars as the interest on the Chickasaw national fund, which I paid out to heads of families in December, 1844; and on the 8th day of September, 1845, I received of the same sixty thousand dollars,

which I have just paid out to the heads of families.

All contracts for the removal of the Chickasaws since 1838 have been made at the Indian department at Washington, and all contracts for their subsistence have either been made there or by Major Armstrong, the superintendent, and have been paid by the Hon. Commissioner of Indian Affairs. The large quantity of rations purchased in Ohio in April and May, 1837, by Lieut. J. D. Searight, for the Chickasaws, and which were sent to Fort Coffee before any of the Chickasaws had left Mississippi, proved a great loss to the Chickasaws.

It is true that the Chickasaws petitioned the government to purchase rations for them in Ohio and Kentucky, but at the same time they wished it to be done under the direction of the superintendent of the removal; but Major Armstrong, the acting superintendent, can give a much more satisfactory account of those rations than myself, as I was not in this country ten days during the years 1837 and 1838, and when I arrived in the coun-

try the rations had all been disposed of in some way.

The incompetent fund and nearly all the orphan fund has been disposed of by the individuals owning it to various persons; it was disposed of by themselves, with the consent of the Chickasaw chiefs or commissioners; they received in payment for it horses, cattle, hogs, goods, negroes, &c., and I have never yet heard a complaint from a single one of those who have sold; it was their individual property, and I believe a large majority of them were benefited by the transaction. I would respectfully refer you, for all further information, to the statement addressed to the Hon. John White, Speaker of the House of Representatives, by the Hon. J. C. Spencer, late Secretary of War, on the 14th of January, 1843, for a full detail of the expense of the Chickasaws, and to whom and for what the money was paid.

Sir: On conferring with the Secretary of War this morning, respecting the resolution of the House of Representatives of the 3d of March last, a copy of which was transmitted to you on the 28th of that month, he has directed me to strongly enjoin upon you to relax no exertion, but on the contrary to make every effort, to ferret out, collect, and report every fact or piece of information which it is possible for you to ascertain, and which it is proper should be made known under the call.

He further directs me to say that your report must reach the department at least three months before the commencement of the next session of Congress, so as to allow the department sufficient time to make the investigation required, and answer fully the resolution of the house of Congress.
