SIR: I have the honor to transmit, herewith, for the consideration and action of the Committee of Ways and Means, a communication from the Adjutant General, submitting estimates from the Quartermaster, Paymaster, and Commissary Generals, of the amounts necessary to be appropriated for the pay, allowances, &c., of three mounted and three foot companies of Florida volunteers, lately called into the service of the United States for six months. The aggregate amount required is \$214,298 27.

SIR: I submit an estimate, in detail, of the probable expense, through the Quartermaster's department, of a volunteer force of three mounted and three foot companies, called into the service of the United States for six months, for the suppression of Indian hostilities in Florida. Such an estimate can be nothing more than an approximation to the truth, because the expenditures must, and do, depend upon the nature of the service on which the troops may be employed, and are liable to be increased or diminished by constantly varying circumstances which cannot be foreseen. The whole amount may not be required, but it would be unsafe to estimate for less.
