## II.—OFFICERS CREATED AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

*By the act (Chap. V) to facilitate the discharge of disabled soldiers from the army and the inspection of convalescent camps, approved December 27, 1862.*

There shall be added to the present medical corps of the army eight medical inspectors, with the rank, pay, and emoluments of a lieutenant colonel of cavalry.

*By the act (Chap. XXII) to increase the clerical and other force of the Quartermaster General's office, and for other purposes, approved February 7, 1863.*

There shall be added to the clerical and other force in the Quartermaster General's office, four clerks of class four, at \$1,800 per annum each.

Ninety clerks of class one, at \$1,200 per annum each.

Thirty copyists and six laborers, at an annual compensation of \$600 each.

*By the act (Chap. XXIII) to authorize the raising of a volunteer force for the better defence of Kentucky, approved February 7, 1863.*

The governor of Kentucky is authorized, under the direction of the President, to raise and organize into regiments a volunteer force not exceeding twenty thousand rank and file, to serve for the term of twelve months within the limits of Kentucky. The regimental and company officers to be appointed by the State of Kentucky, to be entitled to pay when the regiments and companies are filled and in actual service; the officers and men to be placed upon the same footing as to pay and allowances, except bounty, as other volunteers in the service of the United States, while actually employed.

*By the act (Chap. XXIX) to promote the efficiency of the commissary department, approved February 9, 1863.*

There shall be added to the subsistence department of the army one brigadier general, who shall be commissary general of subsistence; one colonel and one lieutenant colonel, to be assistant commissaries general of subsistence; and two majors. The pay of these officers is not stated in the act.

*By the act (Chap. XXXIV) to establish the office of register of deeds for the District of Columbia, approved February 14, 1863.*

There shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register of deeds for the District of Columbia. Compensation, fees.

*By the act (Chap. XXXVII) for the relief of persons for damages sustained by reason of depredations and injuries by certain bands of Sioux Indians, approved February 16, 1863.*

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, three commissioners for the purpose of distributing the appropriation contained in the act, who shall receive for their services and expenses the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars each.

*By the act (Chap. XLIV) to provide for the appointment of an Assistant Register in the Treasury Department and a Solicitor for the War Department, and for other purposes, approved February 20, 1863.*

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for the term of one year, an Assistant Register of the Treasury, at an annual salary of two thousand dollars.

The President is also authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a Solicitor of the War Department, at an annual salary of twenty-five hundred dollars.

*By the act (Chap. LII) to annex a part of the State of New Jersey to the collection district of New York, and to appoint an assistant collector, to reside at Jersey City, approved February 21, 1863.*

The President is authorized to appoint an assistant collector, who shall reside at Jersey City, and receive an annual salary of two thousand dollars.

*By the act (Chap. LIV) to divide the State of Michigan into two judicial districts, and to provide for holding the district and circuit courts therein, approved February 24, 1863.*

The seventh section of the act provides for the appointment of a district judge for the western district of Michigan, at an annual salary of two thousand five hundred dollars.

Section eight provides for the appointment of a marshal and district attorney for the western district of Michigan, who shall each receive for his compensation two hundred dollars per annum and fees.

*By the act (Chap. LVI) to provide a temporary government for the Territory of Arizona, and for other purposes, approved February 24, 1863.*

There shall be appointed a governor of the Territory, at an annual salary of three thousand dollars, and a secretary, at an annual salary of two thousand dollars.

There shall also be appointed a chief justice of the supreme court of the Territory and two associate justices, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars each; and a marshal and district attorney, who shall each receive two hundred and fifty dollars per annum and fees.

There shall also be appointed a surveyor general of the Territory, at an annual salary of three thousand dollars; a draughtsman, at fifteen hundred dollars per annum, with their clerks and deputies, at the same compensation that is allowed to similar offices for the Territory of New Mexico.

There shall be nine members of the council and eighteen members of the house of representatives of the Territory of Arizona, who, with their clerks and sergeant-at-arms, shall receive the same pay as is allowed to similar offices for the Territory of New Mexico.

*By the act (Chap. LVIII) to provide a national currency, secured by a pledge of United States stocks, and to provide for the circulation and redemption thereof, approved February 25, 1863.*

There shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a Comptroller of the Currency, at an annual salary of five thousand dollars.

The Secretary of the Treasury shall appoint a deputy comptroller, at a salary of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The Comptroller shall employ from time to time the necessary clerks for his office, who shall be appointed and classified by the Secretary of the Treasury, as now provided by law.

The Comptroller shall appoint a suitable person or persons to examine the affairs of every banking association, who shall receive at the rate of five dollars per day for his services, and be allowed two dollars per day for every twenty miles of travel in the performance of his duty.

*By the act (Chap. LIX) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the year ending 30th June, 1864, and for the year ending 1863, and for other purposes.*

In section 2 it is provided that the following additional clerical force be authorized, in the several departments, to continue only during the present rebellion, and for one year after its close, viz:

In the office of the Secretary of the Treasury, five clerks of class four.

In the office of the Second Auditor of the Treasury, three clerks of class four, eight of class three, twelve of class two, one assistant messenger at a salary of seven hundred dollars, and one laborer at a salary of six hundred dollars per annum.

In the office of the Third Auditor of the Treasury, six clerks of class four, seven of class three, nine of class two, and eighteen of class one, and ten clerks as copyists, at a rate not exceeding fifty dollars per month.

In the office of the Fifth Auditor of the Treasury, one clerk of class four, two of class three, four of class two, thirteen of class one, and six copying clerks, at an annual salary of six hundred dollars each.

In the office of the assistant treasurer at Boston, one clerk, at a salary of twelve hundred dollars per annum.

In the office of the assistant treasurer at New York, clerks, messengers, keeper, and laborers, whose salaries in the aggregate shall not exceed eight thousand seven hundred dollars.

In the office of the treasurer of the mint, as depository, in lieu of the clerks heretofore authorized, clerks and messenger, whose salaries in the aggregate shall not exceed five thousand five hundred dollars.

In the office of the assistant treasurer at St. Louis, messenger, watchman, and laborer, whose salaries in the aggregate shall not exceed two thousand dollars.

In the office of the Secretary of the Navy, three clerks of the first class and three of the second class.

In the Ordnance Bureau of the navy, one chief clerk and three clerks of the second class.

In the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, two clerks of the first class and two of the second class.

In each of the Bureaus of Medicine and Surgery, Equipment and Recruiting, and Navigation, one laborer, at an annual salary of six hundred dollars.

In the Navy Department, two additional night watchmen, each at an annual salary of six hundred dollars.

In the Pension Office, three clerks of class four, four of class three, four of class two, nine of class one, one additional assistant messenger at a salary of seven hundred dollars, and one additional laborer at a salary of six hundred dollars per annum, for the current year; five additional clerks of class four, six of class three, eight of class two, and sixteen of class one, one additional assistant messenger at a salary of seven hundred dollars, and one additional laborer at a salary of six hundred dollars per annum, for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-four.

In the office of the Secretary of War, six clerks of class four and eight of class one.

In the office of the Chief of Ordnance of the War Department, three clerks of class four, and twenty of class one.

In the office of the Adjutant General, eight clerks of class two and twenty of class one.

In the office of the Commissary General, twelve clerks of class one, and one laborer at a salary of six hundred dollars per annum.

In the office of the Surgeon General, one clerk of class four, one of class three, two of class two, and twenty-one of class one.

In the office of the Paymaster General, four clerks of class three and sixteen of class one; and in the office of the Chief of Engineers, two clerks of class one.

*By the act (Chap. LXVIII) to authorize an increase in the number of major generals and brigadier generals for forces in the service of the United States, approved March 2, 1863.*

There shall be appointed, in addition to the four major generals and nine brigadier generals for the regular army, and the forty major generals and two hundred brigadier generals for the volunteer service; already authorized by law, thirty major generals and seventy-five brigadier generals. Compensation not stated in the act.

*By the act (Chap. LXXI) to amend the laws relating to the Post Office Department, approved March 3, 1863.*

The Postmaster General may employ letter-carriers, who shall receive a salary of eight hundred dollars, which the Postmaster General, under certain conditions, may increase to one thousand dollars per annum.—(Sec. 11.)

The Postmaster General may, in certain cases, establish branch post offices, and pillar and other receiving boxes, and allow to the persons in charge of the same the same compensation that is allowed to letter-carriers.—(Sec. 13.)

*By the act (Chap. LXXIV) to amend an act entitled "An act to provide internal revenue to support the government and pay interest on the public debt," approved July 1, 1862, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a Deputy Commissioner of Internal Revenue, with an annual salary of twenty-five hundred dollars.—(Sec. 19.)

The Secretary of the Treasury may appoint not exceeding three revenue agents, whose compensation shall not exceed two thousand dollars.—(Sec. 20.)

The President may appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a cashier of internal duties, with a salary of twenty-five hundred dollars.—(Sec. 21.)

The Commissioner of Internal Revenue, under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, may allow each assessor such clerks as he may deem necessary, and may fix their compensation.

There shall be designated by the collector, in every district where the same may be necessary, one or more inspectors of manufactured tobacco, who shall receive such fees as may be fixed by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue.—(Sec. 34.)

*By the act (Chap. LXXV) for enrolling and calling out the national forces, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President is authorized to appoint a provost marshal general, with the rank, pay, and emoluments of a colonel of cavalry, and a provost marshal for each district, with the rank, pay, and emoluments of a captain of cavalry.

There shall be appointed in each district a board of enrolment, composed of the provost marshal and two other persons, to be appointed by the President, one of whom shall be a practicing physician. Compensation not stated.

There shall be appointed by the judge advocate a reporter, who shall record the proceedings and testimony before the military court. Compensation not stated.

*By the act (Chap. LXXVI) to prevent and punish frauds upon the revenue, to provide for the more certain and speedy collection of claims in favor of the United States, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to appoint three additional clerks in the office of the Solicitor of the Treasury. Compensation not stated.

*By an act (Chap. LXXVIII) to promote the efficiency of the corps of engineers and of the ordnance department, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The corps of topographical engineers, as a distinct branch of the army, is abolished and merged into the corps of engineers, which shall be organized as follows: one chief engineer, with the rank, pay, and emoluments of a brigadier general; four colonels; ten lieutenant colonels; twenty majors; thirty captains; thirty first and ten second lieutenants.

There shall be added to the ordnance department one lieutenant colonel, two majors, eight captains, and eight first lieutenants.

The increase of the rank and in the number of officers authorized by this act shall continue only during the present rebellion.

*By the act (Chap. LXXIX) making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1864, and for the year ending June 30, 1863, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to appoint, in addition to the four now authorized by law, in the office of the Second Comptroller, four clerks of class four, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars; four clerks of class three, at an annual salary of sixteen hundred dollars; ten clerks of class two, at an annual salary of fourteen hundred dollars; and one assistant messenger, at an annual salary of seven hundred dollars; this additional force to continue during the present rebellion, and for one year after its close.

The treasurer of the mint of the United States and assistant treasurer of the United States at Philadelphia is authorized to designate, from among the clerks in those offices, two who shall act as chief clerks—one in the office of the treasurer of the mint, and one in the office of the assistant treasurer. No compensation is stated in the act.

An assistant collector of customs shall be appointed for the port of New York, at an annual compensation of two thousand dollars.

The signal corps of the army, during the present rebellion, shall be organized as follows: one chief signal officer—a colonel—who shall be signal officer of the army; two majors, who shall be inspectors; one captain, and not exceeding eight lieutenants, for each army corps or military department.

The officers of the signal corps of the army shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and receive the pay and emoluments of cavalry officers of similar grades.

There shall be appointed, in the office of the signal officer, two clerks of class two, at a salary of fourteen hundred dollars per annum each.

The President is authorized to appoint a consul at Cienfuegos, in Cuba, at an annual salary of two thousand five hundred dollars.



*By the act (Chap. LXXXVI) further to regulate proceedings in prize cases, and to amend various acts of Congress in relation thereto, approved March 3, 1863.*

The commissioners in prize cases shall not exceed two in any district of the courts of the United States, to be appointed by the district court of each district, one of whom shall be a retired naval officer. The annual salaries of both commissioners for each district shall not exceed six thousand dollars.

*By the act (Chap. LXXXIX) to authorize the appointment of an Assistant Treasurer of the United States, and to fix the pay of the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, clerks, and messengers in the office of the Treasurer of the United States, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, an assistant treasurer of the United States, at an annual compensation of twenty-five hundred dollars.

The Secretary of the Treasury may appoint a cashier, at an annual salary of two thousand four hundred dollars, and an assistant cashier, at a salary of two thousand dollars per annum.

Four chiefs of divisions, at an annual salary, each, of eighteen hundred dollars; also a messenger, an assistant messenger, and two laborers, in addition to those now allowed, at the compensation now authorized by law.

*By the act (Chap. XCI) to reorganize the courts in the District of Columbia, approved March 3, 1863.*

There shall be established a court, to be called the supreme court of the District of Columbia, to consist of four justices, one of whom shall be denominated chief justice, to be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, at an annual salary of three thousand dollars each.

The court is authorized to appoint a clerk.

The President is also authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a suitable person to revise and codify the laws of the District of Columbia, who shall receive ten dollars per day for his services while so employed.

*By the act (Chap. XCII) to amend "An act to establish a court for the investigation of claims against the United States," approved February 24, 1855, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, two additional judges of the Court of Claims, at an annual salary of four thousand dollars each.

The Court of Claims may appoint a bailiff, who shall receive an annual salary of one thousand dollars. It may also appoint commissioners. Compensation for services not stated.

*By the act (Chap. XCVI) to establish a branch mint of the United States in the Territory of Nevada, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President may appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a superintendent, at an annual salary of two thousand dollars; an assayer, at a salary of eighteen hundred dollars; a melter and refiner, at a salary of eighteen hundred dollars; and a coinier, whose compensation is not stated.

The superintendent, under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, may appoint the requisite clerks, workmen, and laborers, who shall receive the customary pay of their respective stations.

*By the act (Chap. C) to provide circuit courts for the districts of California and Oregon, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

There shall be appointed an additional associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, at a salary of six thousand dollars per annum.

*By the act (Chap. CI) to carry into effect the convention between the United States and the republic of Peru, signed at Lima on the 12th of January, 1863, for the settlement of claims, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President may appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, two commissioners for the settlement of claims of citizens of the United States against Peru, and of citizens of Peru against the United States, who shall receive, for their whole compensation, four thousand dollars each.



The President shall also appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a solicitor or agent on the part of the United States, who shall receive four thousand five hundred dollars in full for his services.

He shall also appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a secretary to the commissioners, who shall be paid, in full for his services, two thousand dollars.

The commissioners, solicitor, and secretary provided for in this act shall each be allowed, in commutation of travelling and other personal expenses, ten dollars a day for the time actually employed in travelling to Lima and returning to their homes.

*By the act (Chap. CVI) to define the powers and duties of the levy court of the county of Washington, District of Columbia, in regard to roads, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The levy court for the county of Washington shall hereafter consist of nine members, to be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, who shall hold their offices for the term of three years, and receive four dollars a day for every day they shall attend a sitting of the court or shall serve on a committee.

They shall have power to appoint a clerk and treasurer, a collector of taxes, a superintendent and supervisors of roads, and to fix the compensation of each.

*By the act (Chap. CLXVII) to provide a temporary government for the Territory of Idaho, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a governor of the Territory, at an annual salary of two thousand five hundred dollars; a secretary, at a salary of two thousand dollars; a chief justice and two associate justices of the supreme court of the Territory, at an annual salary of two thousand five hundred dollars each; a marshal, at four hundred and fifty dollars per annum and fees; and an attorney, at two hundred and fifty dollars per annum and fees.

The act provides for seven members of the territorial council, and thirteen members of the house of representatives of the Territory, who shall receive four dollars a day for their attendance, and four dollars for every twenty miles of travel going to and returning from the sessions of the legislature. The presiding officer of each house shall each receive four dollars a day for each day they shall so preside.

There shall be for each house a chief clerk, who shall receive four dollars a day; a sergeant-at-arms and doorkeeper, an engrossing clerk and an enrolling clerk, at three dollars a day each.

The supreme court and the three district courts of the Territory shall each appoint its own clerk, whose compensation shall be fees.

*By the act (Chap. CLXX) to provide for the collection of abandoned property and for the prevention of frauds in insurrectionary districts within the United States, approved March 12, 1863.*

The Secretary of the Treasury may, from time to time, appoint a special agent or agents to receive and collect all abandoned or captured property in any State or Territory declared to be in insurrection against the United States. Compensation not stated in the act.

*By the joint resolution (No. 24) authorizing the appointment of a commissioner to revise and codify the naval laws of the United States, approved March 3, 1863.*

The President may appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a commissioner to revise and codify the naval laws, at an annual salary of three thousand dollars.

### III.—OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE.

*By the act (Chap. XLX) making appropriations for the consular and diplomatic expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1864, approved February 4, 1863.*

The salary of the consul at Guaymas (formerly fees) shall be fifteen hundred dollars per annum, to commence August 5, 1861.

*By the act (Chap. LXXIV) to amend an act entitled "An act to provide internal revenue to support the government and pay interest on the public debt," approved July 1, 1862, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

In lieu of the pay now allowed by law, the several assessors shall be allowed and paid a salary of fifteen hundred dollars per annum, and where the annual receipts of the collection district shall exceed \$200,000, and not exceed \$400,000, an addition of one-half of one per centum upon such excess; where they shall exceed \$400,000, and not exceed \$800,000, one-fourth of one per centum upon such excess; where they shall exceed \$800,000, one-tenth of one per centum upon such excess. But the salary of no assessor shall exceed the sum of three thousand dollars per annum.

The Secretary of the Treasury is also authorized to fix such additional rates of compensation to the assessors and assistant assessors in California and Oregon and the Territories as he may deem just and reasonable.—(Sec. 22.)

*By the act (Chap. LXXXIX) to authorize the appointment of an Assistant Treasurer of the United States, and to fix the pay of the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, clerks, and messengers in the office of the Treasurer of the United States, approved March 3, 1863.*

The salary of the Treasurer of the United States is increased from four thousand to five thousand dollars per annum, to commence on the first day of July, 1862.

*By the act (Chap. XCIX) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian department and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes for the year ending June 30, 1864, approved March 3, 1863.*

The salary of the Indian agent for Nevada is increased from one thousand to fifteen hundred dollars per annum.

*By the act (Chap. C) to provide circuit courts for the districts of California and Oregon, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The judge of the Supreme Court assigned to the tenth circuit, composed of the districts of California and Oregon, in addition to his salary of \$6,000 per annum, shall receive one thousand dollars for travelling expenses for each year in which he may actually attend a session of the Supreme Court of the United States.

*By the act (Chap. CII) to amend an act entitled "An act to promote the progress of the useful arts," approved March 3, 1863.*

The Commissioner of Patents is authorized, whenever the revenue of the Patent Office will justify it, to pay to the examiners, clerks, and other employes in his office, such sums, in addition to what they have already received, as will make their compensation, respectively, the same as it was before the reduction which took effect after August 31, 1861.

*By the act (Chap. CXVIII) making appropriations for the naval service for the year ending June 30, 1864, and for other purposes, approved March 3, 1863.*

The pay of the civil engineer at the Washington navy yard is fixed at two thousand dollars per annum.

The pay of the civil engineer of the Bureau of Yards and Docks is increased from two thousand to three thousand dollars per annum.

*By the joint resolution (No. 25) fixing the pay of the commandant of the navy yard at Mare island, California, approved March 3, 1863.*

The pay of the naval commandant at Mare island shall be the sea-going pay of his grade.
