Resolved by the senate, the house of representatives concurring, that our senators and representative in Congress are requested to secure the negotiation of treaties, and the enactment of laws, which will enable the government of the United States to speedily remove all Indians residing in a tribal capacity, within the limits of this State, to some point beyond the boundaries of the same, to the end that the large tracts of land now held in reserve for said Indians may be opened to settlement, and be included in the taxable property of the State.

Resolved, That the secretary of state, immediately upon the passage of this resolution, cause certified copies of the same to be forwarded to our senators and representative in Congress.
