LETTER

FROM

THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR,

RECOMMENDING

An appropriation for the Quapaw Indians, now in Kansas.

MARCH 15, 1864. — Referred to the Committee of Ways and Means and ordered to be printed.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
Washington, D. C., March 15, 1864.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith a copy of a communication from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, of the 17th ultimo, and accompanying papers, showing that the sum of \$9,726 33 is due to the Quapaw tribe of Indians, under treaty stipulations, as explained by the Commissioner, and shown by the papers.

I recommend that an appropriation be made by Congress of the sum thus found to be due the Quapaws, to be applied to the payment of expenses incident to their removal from Kansas, and their re-establishment in their own country, from which they have been refugees in consequence of the rebellion.

SIR: The Quapaw Indians having represented to this office that, in their opinion, they had not received the whole amount due to them under treaty stipulations, and desiring an investigation of their accounts, I have caused an examination to be made of the books and settlements in the office of the Second Auditor of the Treasury, and those of this office, a statement of which I herewith transmit, showing the payments made under the treaties of 1818, 1824 and 1833, together with the stipulated amounts provided for in said treaties.

The tables connected with this report embrace all the payments made to the Quapaws, under the several stipulations of each treaty up to this date, which amount in the aggregate to the sum of \$164,320 50. The sum provided for and stipulated to be paid to them, under the three treaties, from the date of the ratifications of the first, in 1819, to the close of the fiscal year 1863, amounts to \$179,898 74, leaving a deficit unprovided for of \$15,578 24, less the amount of \$5,851 91 of accumulated balances now standing to the credit of the Quapaws upon the books of this office. Deduct this latter sum of \$5,851 91 from the \$15,578 24, it leaves the amount of \$9,726 33, as the true balance due the Indians.

In order to explain more fully the cause of this deficiency, I enclose copy of a statement of the Second Comptroller, marked "A," showing the amounts of appropriation for the Quapaws carried to the surplus fund, in which you will see that the sums so carried, under the heads of "fulfilling" and "annuities," are nearly equal to the amount of the deficiency, no part of which seems to have been re-appropriated.

These Indians are now among the refugees in Kansas, and are very poor and destitute, having been driven by the rebels from their homes in the Indian country, without any means of support whatever, except the small sum of \$2,660 appropriated annually, at the discretion of the President, for educational purposes, and support of blacksmith and assistant.

In view of their destitute circumstances and extreme want, I would respectfully suggest that you report to Congress the amount found due to them, and ask an appropriation to meet the same, in order that justice may be done, and some assistance rendered them in re-establishing themselves in their own country, whenever the government shall be able to assert its rightful authority, and secure to them a peaceable possession of their homes.

SIR: In reply to your letter of the 8th instant, requesting a statement of all moneys carried to the surplus fund from the different appropriations in favor of the Quapaw Indians, since their first treaty in 1818, I would state that the appropriation books of this office are imperfect prior to 1834, and the surplus fund warrants, and other papers connected with them up to that time, have been lost or destroyed by fire in 1833.

I enclose herewith a statement, marked "A," made up from the books and surplus fund warrants on file in this office, also an item obtained from the books of the First Comptroller, which I hope will afford the desired information.

Treaty made with the Quapaws, May 13, 1833; ratified April 12, 1834.—Article 3, the United States agree to remove them to their new homes and supply them one year's provisions, appropriated March 3, 1835, \$18,100. Article 3, the United States agree to furnish them one hundred cows, one hundred breeding hogs, one hundred sheep, ten yoke working cattle, twenty-five ploughs, one hundred axes, one hundred hoes, four ox carts, one wagon and rigging, twenty iron hand-mills, tools to the amount of \$200, looms, wheels, reels, and wool cards, \$200, one hundred blankets, fifty rifles, five shot-guns, ten kegs powder, and six hundred pounds lead, farmer-blacksmith, with tools, shop, iron and steel not exceeding one ton per year, \$5,088 50. Article 3, for educational purposes, \$1,000 per year. Article 4, in lieu of present annuities, the United States will pay debts of the Quapaws to the amount of \$4,180. Article 4, for laborers, and building cabins, \$1,000. Article 4, for annuity, twenty years, \$2,000 per year.
