II.-OFFICES CREATED, AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

[Prepared in the office of the Secretary of the Senate.]

By the act (Chap. —) to amend "An act regulating the tenure of certain civil offices," approved April 5, 1869,

It is enacted that during any recess of the Senate the President is empowered, in his discretion, to suspend any civil officer appointed by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, except judges of the United States courts, until the end of the next session of the Senate, and to designate some suitable person, subject to be removed in his discretion by the designation of another, to perform the duties of such suspended officer in the mean time; and such person so designated shall take the oaths and give the bonds required by law to be taken and given by the suspended officer, and shall, during the time he performs his duties, be entitled to the salary and emoluments of such office, no part of which shall belong to the officer suspended.

By the act (Chap. —) to carry into effect the convention of July 4, 1868, between the United States and Mexico, for the adjustment of claims, approved April 7, 1869,

It is enacted by section one that the President shall nominate and, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, appoint a commissioner, on the part of the United States, to hear and decide, conjointly with the commissioner to be appointed on the part of the republic of Mexico, the claims comprehended in the provisions of the convention of July 4, 1868, between the United States and Mexico.

Section two enacts that the compensation of the commissioner shall be at such rate, not exceeding \$1,500 a year in the currency of the United States, as may be determined by agreement between the executive departments of this government and of Mexico. The compensation of the secretary to be appointed on the part of the United State under the provisions of the convention shall be at such rate, not exceeding \$2,500 a year in the currency of the United States, as shall be determined in the manner aforesaid.

Section three enacts that the President be, and hereby is, authorized to appoint a suitable person as agent on behalf of the United States to attend the commissioners, to present and support claims on behalf of this government, to answer claims made upon it, and to represent it generally in all matters connected with the investigation and decision thereof; the compensation of such agent, not to exceed \$4,000, shall be determined and allowed by the President; and the President is hereby authorized to make [such] provision for the contingent expenses of the commission and for the advances contemplated by the 6th article of the convention as to him shall appear reasonable and proper. The salaries, expenses, advances, and the compensation to be paid to the umpire, when determined, shall be paid out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

By the act (Chap. —) making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1869, and additional appropriations for the year ending June 30, 1870, and far other purposes, approved April 10, 1869,

Section seven enacts that there shall be a superintendent of the Department of the Interior, who shall be ex officio captain of the watch, and who shall peform such other duties as may be assigned to him by the Secretary of the Interior, and who shall receive the same compensation as is provided by existing laws for the superintendent of the treasury building.

By the act (Chap. —) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes for the year ending June 30, 1870, approved April 10, 1869,

Establishes the number of superintendents of Indian affairs at eleven and the number of Indian agents at fifty-nine, and appropriates the sum of \$114,700 in gross for their pay, the exact salary of neither class being designated.

The superintendents of Indian affairs are distributed as follows:

Two superintendents for the tribes east of the Rocky mountains; one for Oregon; one for Washington Territory; one for the Territory of New Mexico; one for the Territory of Utah; one for California; one for Nevada; one for the Territory of Arizona; one for Montana, and one for Idaho.

The Indian agents are thus distributed:

Three for the tribes in Oregon; four for the tribes in New Mexico; one additional for Indians in New Mexico; one for the tribes in New Mexico; one for the tribes in Utah; one additional for the Indians in Utah; one for the tribes in the Territory of Utah; eleven for the tribes east of the Rocky mountains; two for the tribes east of the Rocky mountains; four for the Indians east of the Rocky mountains, viz: Sioux and Seminoles, the Omaha, Kick-

apoo, Kansas, and Neosho agencies; three for the tribes east of the Rocky mountains; one for the Indians in the State of New York; one for the Delaware Indians; one for Green Bay, Wisconsin; three for the tribes in Washington Territory; one for the Wichatas and neighboring tribes west of the Choctaws and Chickasaws; one for the tribes east of the Rocky mountains; one for the Indians in the Territory of New Mexico; one for the Ponca tribe; one for the Pawnees; one for the Yancton Sioux; three for the tribes in the Territory of Washington; one for the Grand River and Uintah bands of Indians in the Territory of Colorado; two for the Upper Missouri and the country adjacent thereto; one for the Ottawas, Chippewas of Swan creek and Black river, and Christian Indians in Kansas; three agents for the State of California; one for the Klowa, Apache, and Comanche Indians; one for the Sisseton and Warpeton bands of Dakota or Sioux Indians; one for the bands of Sacs and Foxes of the Mississippi, now in Tama county, Iowa; one for the Indians in the State of Nevada, and one for the Crow tribe of Indians: Provided, That it shall be the duty of the President to dispense with the services of such Indian agents and superintendents herein mentioned as may be practicable; and where it is practicable, he shall require the same person to perform the duties of two agencies or superintendences for one salary.

To pay a commission, not to exceed two persons, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Interior, who shall proceed to the country of the Senecas, mixed Senecas and Shawnees, and Quapaws, and make careful investigations of their claims for losses, per 12th article treaty

February 23, 1867, \$4,000.

To pay for the services of three persons, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Interior, to ascertain and report the amount of money, if any, due by the United States to the Wyandotte Indians under existing treaties, and so forth, per 13th article treaty February 23, 1867,

\$3,000.

Section four enacts that for the purpose of enabling the President to execute the powers conferred by this act he is hereby authorized, at his discretion, to organize a board of commissioners, to consist of not more than ten persons, to be selected by him from men eminent for their intelligence and philanthropy, to serve without pecuniary compensation, who may, under his direction, exercise joint control with the Secretary of the Interior over the disbursement of the appropriations made by this act or any part thereof that the President may designate; and to pay the necessary expenses of transportation, subsistence, and clerk hire of said commissioners while actually engaged in said service there is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$25,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary.

By the act (Chap. ——) to declare and fix the status of judge advocates of the army, approved

April 10, 1869,

The number of judge advocates of the army is fixed at eight, and the President is authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to fill all vacancies which have occurred or may hereafter occur therein.

By the act (Chap. -) to amend the judicial system of the United States, approved April 10, 1869,

It is enacted by section one that the Supreme Court of the United States shall hereafter consist of the Chief Justice of the United States and eight associate justices, any six of whom shall constitute a quorum; and for the purposes of this act there shall be appointed an addi-

tional associate justice of said court.

Section two enacts that for each of the nine existing judicial circuits there shall be appointed a circuit judge, who shall reside in his circuit, and who shall possess the same power and jurisdiction therein as the justice of the Supreme Court allotted to the circuit. The circuit courts in each circuit shall be held by the justice of the Supreme Court allotted to the circuit, or by the circuit judge of the circuit, or by the district judge of the district sitting alone, or by the justice of the Supreme Court and circuit judge sitting together, in which case the justice of the Supreme Court shall preside, or in the absence of either of them by the other, (who shall preside,) and the district judge. And such courts may be held at the same time in the different districts of the same circuits, and cases may be heard and tried by each of the judges holding any such court sitting apart by direction of the presiding justice or judge, who shall designate the business to be done by each. The circuit judges shall each receive an annual salary of \$5,000.

Section three enacts that nothing in this act shall affect the powers of the justices of the Supreme Court as judges of the circuit court, except in the appointment of clerks of the circuit courts, who in each circuit shall be appointed by the circuit judge of that circuit, and the clerks of the district courts shall be appointed by the judges thereof respectively: Provided, That the present clerks of said courts shall continue in office till other appointments

be made in their place.

Section five enacts that any judge of any court of the United States who, having held his commission as such at least ten years, shall, after having attained to the age of seventy years, resign his office, shall thereafter, during the residue of his natural life, receive the same salary which was by law payable to him at the time of his resignation.

Section six enacts that this act shall take effect on the first Monday of December, eighteen hundred and sixty-nine.

-) making San Diego, California, a port of delivery, By the joint resolution (Chap. approved April 10, 1869,

San Diego, California, is created a port of delivery in the customs collection district of San Francisco, and that the deputy collector of that port is to receive the same salary as other deputy collectors of the district.

III.—OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, AND THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE DURING THE SAME PERIOD.

By the act (Chap. ---) making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1869, and additional appropriations for the year ending June 30, 1870, approved April 10, 1869,

The provisions of the resolution of the House of Representatives of March 3, 1857, giving Daniel Buck, a clerk in the office of the Clerk of the House of Representatives, compensation for preparing list of appropriations, &c., is extended to his successor in office—the increase of salary under said resolution being \$300: and the compensation of the clerk in charge of the engrossment and enrollment of the House bills and joint resolutions is increased from \$2,160 per annum to the same rate as that allowed the reading clerks of the House, viz: \$2,592—increase of salary \$432.

The salary of the First Comptroller of the Treasury is established at \$5,000 per annum

from and after the 1st day of July, 1869-increase of salary \$1,500.
