SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the following resolution passed by the Senate May 15th instant:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and he is hereby, requested to communicate to the Senate, if not inconsistent with the public interests, any opinion given by the Attorney-General upon the legality of a sale of pine timber, belonging to the Chippewa Indians, to A. H. Wilder, of Minnesota.

In reply you are respectfully informed that the honorable Attorney-General has not, to my knowledge, given any opinion upon the legality of a sale of pine timber, belonging to the Chippewa Indians, to A. H. Wilder. When an opinion is rendered by that officer it will afford me pleasure to communicate it to the Senate, if desired so to do.
