SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of Senate resolution of the 1st instant, directing the Secretary of the Treasury to furnish certain information relative to the accounts of Alfred B. Meacham, late superintendent of Indian affairs for the State of Oregon, and to inclose herewith the report of the Second Comptroller upon the subjectmatter of the resolution.

SIR: By your reference of the 3d instant, I am in the receipt of a resolution of the United States Senate, calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury for information relative to the settlement of the accounts of Alfred B. Meacham, superintendent of Indian affairs, and the amount subsequently paid said Meacham for salary, &c.

In reply to your request for a report, I have to say that the accounts of A. B. Meacham, superintendent of Indian affairs of the State of Oregon, were settled April 28, 1879, and on that date he was found to be in default on said accounts in the sum of \$7,676.96, under his bond of April 1, 1869.

On or about September 25, 1878, Mr. Meacham was appointed special agent of the Interior Department to make certain payments to Indians, and gave an official bond as security for the faithful disbursement of the money placed in his hands. Among other disbursements made by Mr. Meacham under this bond is found one dated November 1, 1879, as follows :

Mr. Meacham became entitled, as a member of the Ute Commission, to salary and traveling expenses in the sum of \$5,373.34, and the unpaid balance of \$319.84 due him has been applied, in part, to extinguish his indebtedness to the United States of \$220, as disbursing officer of the Modoc Commission of 1873 and 1874.

So far as I am aware, no payments have been made to Mr. Meacham direct from the Treasur's since April 28, 1879, the date his default was discovered.

The foregoing is beliated to be a compliance with the resolution of the Senate so far as the rewards of this office furnish any information.
