Mr. SAWYER, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 3587.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 3587) granting a pension to Stacey Keener, widow of Tillman B. Keener, who served in the Indian war, have examined the same and report:

The report on which this bill was passed by the House is concurred in, and is as follows:

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 3587) granting a pension to Stacey Keener, have considered the same and beg leave to report:

The claimant's deceased husband, Tillman B. Keener, was a musician in Capt. Lawson J. Keener's Company of Col. William Wellborn's Regiment Alabama Mounted Volunteers, Indian war, from April 19, 1837, to August 19, 1837.

The claimant prays a pension at the same rate as is allowed by law to the widows of the soldiers of the war of 1812.

She is old, has no income, and is supported by relatives. These facts are vouched for by Mr. McRae, a Representative in Congress from the State of Arkansas.

Your committee think the case a deserving one and the passage of the bill is therefore recommended.

The bill is reported favorably, with a recommendation that it do pass.
