LOYAL SEMINOLE INDIANS.

MARCH 1, 1899.—Ordered to be printed.

Mr. PETTIGREW, from the Committee on Indian Affairs, submitted the following

R E P O R T.

In compliance with the Senate resolution of January 17, 1899, instructing the Committee on Indian Affairs to investigate the claims of the loyal Seminole Indians for losses sustained during the war of the rebellion, and to report by bill or otherwise its conclusions to the Senate, together with such recommendations as might be deemed advisable, the Committee on Indian Affairs has thoroughly investigated the case, and it submits herewith a proposed amendment to the bill making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1899, with a recommendation that the proposed amendment be incorporated into the bill aforesaid.

At the beginning of the war of the rebellion, in 1861, the Seminole tribe or nation was located in the central part of the Indian Territory. These Indians at that time had adopted the habits and customs of civilized people. They had built for themselves comfortable homes and had accumulated much property, consisting of cattle, hogs, farm implements, household furniture, etc. They were thus situated when hostilities between the North and South began, and, like many other communities on the border, they divided in sentiment, some transferring their allegiance to the Confederacy and some remaining loyal to the United States.

Those remaining loyal were forced to abandon their homes and country and go North, leaving most of their property within the lines of the Confederate forces. During their absence their country was invaded by hostile forces and marauding bands, many of their homes were destroyed, and most of their personal property captured or stolen. Prior to the war of the rebellion provision had been made for the protection of the Seminoles against the spoliations of war, through a legalized promise of indemnity in case they suffered from the depredations incident to domestic strife. The protection guaranteed them is embodied in article 18 of the Creek-Seminole treaty of August 7, 1856, which says:

The United States shall protect the Creeks and Seminoles from domestic strife, from hostile invasion, and from aggression by other Indians and white persons not subject to their jurisdiction and laws, and for all other injuries resulting from such invasion or aggression full indemnity is hereby guaranteed to the party or parties injured out of the Treasury of the United States. In pursuance of the terms of this agreement those of the Seminoles who remained loyal to the Government duly filed their claims and commissioners were appointed to investigate the same, as was provided in article 4 of the treaty of 1866, which recognized the justice of their claims and guaranteed payment thereof when adjusted. The commissioners prepared a roll of the loyal Seminoles, examined each individual claim, made awards thereon, and reported their conclusions to the Secretary of the Interior, all of which are embodied in Senate Doc. No. 72, third session Fifty-fifth Congress.

Although the commissioners found that there was due the loyal Seminoles a total of \$213,888.95, your committee finds cause to differ with their conclusions. The commissioners allowed the face value of every claim presented. After careful investigation, your committee recommends a deduction of 45 per cent from the total allowed by the commissioners. From the remainder should be subtracted \$50,000, the sum allowed by, and paid under, the provisions of the sundry civil appropriation act of July 28, 1866, as follows:

For this amount, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the losses that may be awarded under the provisions of article 4 of treaty March 21, 1866, as per third article of said treaty, \$50,000.

Upon the amount remaining your committee has figured 5 per cent from the 16th day of August, 1866, to the present time, in accordance with the terms of article 3 of the treaty of August 16, 1866, which is as follows:

And in case said fifty thousand dollars shall be insufficient to pay all said awards, it shall be distributed pro rata to those whose claims are so allowed; and until said awards shall be thus paid the United States agree to pay to said Indians, in such manner and for such purposes as the Secretary of the Interior may direct, interest at the rate of five per cent per annum from the date of the ratification of this treaty. (14 Stat., 757.)

In the treaty made with the Seminoles on December 16, 1897, by the Dawes Commission and ratified by Congress on the 1st day of July, 1898, it was provided as follows:

The loyal Seminole claim shall be submitted to the United States Senate, which shall make final determination of the same, and, if sustained, shall provide for payment thereof within two years from the date hereof.

We therefore find that there is due said loyal Seminoles the sum of \$177,085, and we recommend the payment of that sum in full settlement of said award.

The accompanying papers are made a part of this report.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, Washington, January 27, 1899.

SIR: I am in receipt of your letter of the 26th instant, acknowledging the receipt of departmental letter of the 20th instant, embodying the report of the commissioners appointed to investigate the Seminole losses, and inquiring if the Department has anything further relating to the loyal Seminole claim.

In reply, you are advised that the only information concerning said claim that is in the possession of the Department is to be found in the report of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs on January 19, 1899, a copy of which has heretofore been transmitted to your committee in the report on H. R. 11217, being an amendment to the bill making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department. In said report the Commissioner states:

"Under the treaty named a commission was appointed, which commission, under date of November 26, 1867, reported to the Department that the aggregate of claims filed with the commission amounted to \$216,351.20; that the amount allowed on said claims by the said commission amounted to \$213,888.95. The amount paid thereon pro rata was \$50,000, leaving an unpaid balance of \$163,888.95."

SIR: On January 18 the Department received the resolution of the Senate of the United States dated 17th instant, as follows:

United States dated 17th instant, as follows: "Whereas by article four of the treaty of March twenty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, with the Seminole Nation of Indians, the Secretary of the Interior was authorized to investigate and determine the losses sustained by loyal Seminoles during the war of the rebellion; and

during the war of the rebellion; and "Whereas by the agreement of December sixteenth, eighteen hundred and ninetyseven, with said nation it was and is provided as follows: 'The loyal Seminole claim shall be submitted to the United States Senate, which shall make final determination of the same, and, if sustained, shall provide for payment thereof within two years from date thereof:' Therefore,

"Resolved, That the Secretary of the Interior be, and is hereby, requested to furnish the Senate with a copy of the roll of said loyal Seminoles, and also a copy of the report of the commissioners appointed by him to investigate and determine said losses, in pursuance of the said treaty of eighteen hundred and sixty-six. And be it further

"Resolved, That the Committee on Indian Affairs be, and is hereby, instructed to investigate the matter, in accordance with said treaty and agreement, and report by bill or otherwise its conclusions to the Senate, with such recommendations as may be deemed advisable."

Said resolution was duly referred to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for early report in duplicate. In compliance with said resolution, I now have the honor to transmit copies of the loyal Seminole rolls and the report of the commissioners appointed to investigate Seminole losses.

SIR: The undersigned, a commission by appointment of the Secretary of the Interior, under the authority of the fourth article of the treaty of the 21st March, 1866, between the United States and the Seminole Indians, "to adjudge and determine the claims of loyal Seminoles for losses actually sustained by reason of their having remained loyal and faithful to their treaty stipulations to the United States during the recent rebellion," etc., respectfully report that, having received our instructions, we immediately started for the Seminole country.

By appointment of the Acting Commissioner of Indian Affairs, it was arranged that the commission should meet in the city of St. Louis, Mo., on the 14th of August. The undersigned were prompt in their meeting, but failed to meet a third commissioner, of whose appointment we had been duly advised. We waited a reasonable time for his appearance, then telegraphed the Department for instructions, and received an answer authorizing us "to wait one day longer, and if he did not appear, then we should proceed and execute our mission without him." Acting upon our instructions, we promptly left St. Louis and proceeded by the most direct and expeditious route to the field of our labors. After a fatiguing trip, made long by the modes of travel incident to the Far West, we reached the Seminole Agency on the night of the 9th of September, and on the morning following we began our duties.

Upon our arrival we found the northern portion of the Seminoles in council, and at once put ourselves in communication with them, making known our business, and thus giving the "public notice" required by the terms of our instructions, which notice was promptly disseminated among the people of the nation by the chief and headmen of the different bands. We also communicated with John Jumper, a chief residing with the southern portion of the Seminoles at the old agency, distant 50 miles, and requested that he would make known our arrival and business among that portion of the Seminole people. In due time we received his acknowledgment, which, with a copy of our letter, is herewith transmitted.

It will be seen by reference to some of the claims that the claimants have put in for loss of guns; also for loss of cash (gold and silver coin). In the instance of a loss of guns, we have, through witnesses, satisfied ourselves that the claimants carried a gun off with them at the time of leaving home, and only allowed for guns when the claimant carried away one or more and had to leave others behind. In the item of cash, occurring in some of the claims, we have made our investiga-

In the item of cash, occurring in some of the claims, we have made our investigations as full as possible, always satisfying ourselves through witnesses that the claimant actually possessed said money and lost it on account of the disturbed condition of the country in consequence of the rebellion. In every such case the money was lost at the Budd Creek fight, occurring on the night of the 25th of December, 1861, while the claimant was endeavoring to escape from the rebel forces then overrunning the Seminole country.

These loyal Indians had successfully beaten the rebels in two previous fights, but on the 25th of December they were surprised in camp and many massacred, and lost all their effects. We are of opinion that the claimants are entitled to include said item in their bill of losses, as much so as if the loss had been in cattle, especially so when we consider that their best efforts were exhausted to prevent its loss.

Our investigations were thorough in each case, especially as regarded the amounts and the estimates of prices therefor; we obtained reliable information from disinterested persons of prices ruling the market in the Seminole country at the breaking out of the war, and in our awards governed ourselves accordingly. We are satisfied that the prices allowed the claimants are reasonable and just, certainly not too high.

We held our sessions as a board from day to day, and neither commissioner transacted any business in the absence of the other. We received much valuable assistance in our investigations from the chief, John Chupco, and the headmen of the various bands; also from Robert Johnson, interpreter.

In our expenditures for expenses we were as economical as circumstances would allow, and feel warranted in saying that we incurred no bills, chargeable to the Government, except such as were necessary to the proper discharge of our duties.

During our labors we examined and determined 340 claims, amounting in the aggregate to \$213,915.95.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, Washington, January 21, 1899.

SIR: The amendment to H. R. 11217, which was referred by you on the 13th instant to this Department with request for a report thereon, was transmitted to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for report and recommendation. Said amendment is as follows:

"That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and is hereby, authorized to pay the awards made to the loyal Seminole Indians, under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, as per article four of the treaty of March twenty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, and paragraph fourteen of the agreement of December sixteenth, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven; and the sum of one hundred and sixty-three thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight dollars and ninety-five cents is hereby appropriated for the purpose: *Provided*, That if any of the said loyal Seminoles whose names are on the rolls, as made up in pursuance of the said treaty of eighteen hundred and sixty-six, shall have died, then the amount due such deceased persons, respectively, shall be paid to their legal heirs."

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs states that in accordance with requirements of the fourth article of the treaty with the Seminoles of March 26, 1856, a commission was appointed by the Secretary of the Interior to ascertain and determine the amounts due loyal Seminoles for losses sustained during the civil war; that said commission reported the aggregate claims filed with it amounted to \$216,351.20; the amount allowed on said claims amounted to \$213,888.95; the amount paid thereon pro rata was \$50,000, leaving an unpaid balance of \$163,888.95.

The claims, numbering 329, are on file in this [Indian] office, and in each case the property lost is described, with the value of each item shown, accompanied by testimony of claims and witnesses taken by the commissioners."

I am informally advised that it would require a longer time than the present session of Congress will continue to make copies of said claims and the testimony of the witnesses taken in each case. Copies of the reports of the Commissioner, dated January 19, 1899, and February 21, 1899, are inclosed herewith.

The Department has no other information except that designated by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

SIR: I am in receipt, by your reference of the 13th instant, for consideration, report, and recommendation, of H. R. 11217, by the chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, of an amendment intended to be proposed to the bill (H. R. 11217)

making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, etc., for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1900, as follows: "That the Secretary of the Interior be, and is hereby, authorized to pay the awards

made to the loyal Seminole Indians, under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, as per article four of the treaty of March twenty-first, eighteen hundred and sixty-six, and paragraph fourteen of the agreement of December sixteenth, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven; and the sum of one hundred and sixty-three thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight dollars and ninety-five cents is hereby appropriated for the purpose: *Provided*, That if any of the said loyal Seminoles whose names are on the rolls, as made in pursuance of the said treaty of eighteen hundred and sixtysix, shall have died, then the amount due such deceased persons, respectively, shall be paid to their legal heirs."

In compliance with the request for report, I have the honor to state that in accordance with the requirements of the fourth article of the treaty with the Seminoles of March 21, 1866, a commission was appointed by the Secretary of the Interior to ascertain and determine the amounts due loyal Seminoles for losses sustained during the civil war.

Under the treaty named a commission was appointed, which commission, under date of November 26, 1867, reported to the Department that the aggregate of claims filed with the commission amounted to \$216,351.20; that the amount allowed on said claim by the said commission amounted to \$213,888.95. The amount paid thereon, pro rata, was \$50,000, leaving an unpaid balance of \$163,888.95.

Attention is invited to the report of the commission and the list of awards made to the loyal Seminoles, submitted to the Senate in response to Senate resolution of the 17th instant, by report of the 19th instant, and recommendation is made that the proposed amendment receive the approval of the Department and of the United States Senate.
