Mr. WILSON, of Missouri, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 3199.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 3199) granting a pension to Margaret Turner, have given the same due consideration, and respectfully report :

The claimant is the widow of Isham Turner, who served as a private in the company commanded by Capt. Stell, in Lieut. Col. Wood's Third Battalion Georgia Volunteers, Florida Indian war. He enlisted June 3, 1836, and was honorably discharged with the company on August 31, 1836, at West Point, Ga.

William A. Todd and J. L. Stroope, citizens of Clark County, Arkansas, swear that the claimant is about sixty-five years old, infirm in health, with no property or income, and entirely dependent upon her relatives for support.

There are many precedents for the proposed legislation, and your Committee, believing the bill to be meritorious, respectfully return the same, recommending its passage.
