Mr. HILL, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 9163.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 9163) granting a pension to Mary Hogan, have considered the same and report:

The claimant's late husband, Thomas Hogan, deceased, was a private in Battery D, Third United States Artillery, and served from August 4, 1840, to August 4, 1845, when honorably discharged by reason of expiration of term of service. The records show that the battery participated in the campaign and operations against hostile Seminole Indians in Florida from 1840 to 1842.

The testimony filed in support of the bill establishes the identity of the claimant as the widow of the soldier. Her residence is Chateaugay, Franklin County, N. Y. It is also shown that the claimant is an aged and worthy woman and that she has no means of support.

In view of the facts stated your committee report the bill back with a favorable recommendation.
