IN SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES,

FEBRUARY 7, 1822.

Mr. RUGGLES, from the Committee of Claims, to whom was referred the petition of Samuel Walker, of Indiana,

REPORTED:

The petitioner states that, during the late war with Great Britain, le Indians had become troublesome on the frontiers of the state of diana; that Colonel George Hunt was ordered by General Harrison to protect the inhabitants from their depredations, by calling into the service several companies of the militia at different times, and b furnish them with provisions. The petitioner states, that he was imployed and appointed to furnish them with provisions, during the me they should be in the service, which was accordingly done. He arther states, that the detached situation of the different companies was such, being scattered around an extensive settlement, that it was impossible to issue regular rations, and obtain the usual vouchers for the same. The provisions were therefore furnished as they were rewired, under the direction and inspection of the commanding officer each company. For all which he has received payment, except the rovisions furnished Captain William Holman's company, which ontinued in service about three months. The petitioner has stated is account and made an affidavit of the correctness of the same. e has also introduced the evidence of the ensign of the company, gether with several others to corroborate his own affidavit. From eletter of the Third Auditor, it appears that Captain Holman's mpany was in the service of the United States from the 28th of ovember, 1812, to the 28th of February, 1813; and that they have en paid for that period of time. From the number contained in the spany, it appears that a greater quantity of rations would be than the supplies charged by Mr. Walker would constitute.

The committee are of opinion that the petitioner has an equitable in for the settlement of his accounts. They, therefore, report a for his relief.
