OFFICE OF COMMISSARY GENERAL OF SUBSISTENCE,
Washington, February 16, 1832.

SIR: I have the honor to hand you the accompanying statement, made in obedience to a resolution passed in the Senate on the 12th of January.

Of the amount of money drawn from the Treasury on account of the removal and subsistence of the Choctaw Indians, about sixty thousand dollars were remitted previously to the end of the third quarter of 1831, nearly all of which is accounted for. The subsequent remittances, amounting to more than one hundred thousand dollars, were intended to provide for the active operations that have taken, and are now taking place; and to meet engagements made by the agents for large quantities of corn and beef for the subsistence of the Indians, according to treaty stipulation, during the year after their arrival at their new homes. A portion of the last mentioned amount was expended in the fourth quarter; and fifty thousand dollars of it, which have scarcely yet reached the disbursing agents, are charged on the books of the Treasury to Major F. W. Armstrong, Choctaw agent, who being about to proceed in November last to the new Choctaw country, undertook, at my request, to procure that sum in notes of the Branch Bank at Nashville, Tennessee, which city lay in his route, and to transfer thirty-five thousand dollars to Capt. Brown, and fifteen thousand dollars to Lieut. Stephenson.

Such is the nature of this service, and the great distance at which it is carried on, that large advances of money were absolutely indispensable to effect the object of the Government. In making these advances, little regard could be had to the usage of the department in ordinary cases, to wit: the exaction of a settlement of one quarter's expenditures before the means of meeting those of another were remitted. Thus, large balances appear against individuals who have expended a part of such apparent balances, and have hardly received the remainder; being an accumulation against them on the books of the Treasury, generally, of two entire quarters' expenditures, the accounts for the first quarter not having arrived prior to the necessity of providing the disbursing officer with the next. But there can be no doubt, from the high standing of the superintendents and agents, and the faithful execution of other and important trusts which have before been confided to them, that their pecuniary responsibilities will be speedily and satisfactorily adjusted.

It may be proper to remark, that the pay of the officers and agents was graduated, as nearly as possible, to that of disbursing staff officers; and when the expense and privation to which they are liable are taken into consideration, it will not be deemed too high.
