DECEMBER 31, 1833.

MR. TIPTON made the following report, with Senate bill No. 38.

The Committee on Claims, to which was referred the petition of John Kimberlin, of Indiana, report:

That the petitioner claims payment for corn and other property used by a number of volunteers from Kentucky and the Indiana Territory, who assembled to bury the dead, and protect the frontier inhabitants of the Territory from an attack of the hostile Indians, at a place called Pigeon Roost, in September, 1812. It is stated that about 590 volunteers assembled and encamped near the farm of the claimant, and, being destitute of provision and forage, they used the corn and other property of petitioner to a considerable amount; and the committee report a bill for his relief.
