SIR: I have the honor to inclose herewith several petitions of persons living in the Indian Territory requesting Congress to appropriate money to assist the "W. T. Whitaker Home" at Pryor Creek, in the Indian Territory, for the education and care of orphan children of white citizens of the United States who live in said Territory. Two of said petitions have been referred to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for his consideration, report, and recommendation. In returning the same, he recommends "that the petitions in question be forwarded to the President of the Senate with the recommendation that they be laid before that body in which the Indian appropriation act is now pending, in order that, should it be deemed expedient and proper, a reasonable appropriation may be inserted in the Indian bill for the benefit of the Home." A copy of said report is herewith inclosed.

The recommendation of the Commissioner is concurred in by the Department, and the petitions received by it in behalf of the W. T. Whitaker Home, being six in number, are submitted for consideration by the Senate, as above indicated.

SIR: The office has received, by your reference for consideration, report, and recommendation, two petitions from persons in Cherokee Nation, asking that Congress make a reasonable appropriation to assist an institution in the Cherokee Nation called the W. T. Whitaker Orphan Home, an institution established through the efforts of Mr. Whitaker for the benefit of white orphans in the Cherokee Nation.

With respect to these petitions I have the honor to say that the office is without any information whatever as to this institution. An informal conference has been had with Inspector Wright on the subject, and he says that he has never visited the place and is not prepared to make any suggestions with reference to the matter.

The objects of this institution, however, are such as naturally appeal to the sympathy and interest of all good citizens, and I therefore have the honor to recommend that the petitions in question be forwarded to the President of the Senate, with the recommendation that they be laid before that body in which the Indian appropriation act is now pending, in order that, should it be deemed expedient and proper, a reasonable appropriation may be inserted in the Indian bill for the benefit of the Home.

HONORABLE SIR: We beg to present this petition to you in behalf of the poor orphan children of the Indian Territory. There are doubtless thousands of them, and for the most part growing up in ignorance and immorality. Of course you

know all this after a moment's reflection. The citizens of the Territory have every thing provided for their comfort and development, but the poor white man who tills the soil must die and leave his posterity homeless and with no school advantages and too often with not even the bare necessities of life.

W. T. Whitaker, a citizen whose generous heart led him to establish a home for the white orphans, has sacrificed his business and his means to provide a home for them, but yet his means are too small for the demands. He now has 39 white orphans in the home and has 200 applications in his office of children who are homeless, but he can not, with the present accommodations, care for them. We beg you to consider the condition of the orphans in the Territory and grant us the request of our petition. We feel sure they can make as strong an appeal to your consideration and sympathy as has the citizens of the Territory. And if only a very small per cent of the money that is being used to settle this Territorial question was used to build a home, shops, and schools for the white orphan, we believe it would yield a more profitable and satisfactory return than all the rest of the money expended on the Territory, for instead of the hundreds of ignorant, immoral, dependent citizens, we would have honest, intelligent, self-supporting men, who would be an honor to the country.
