Estimates of appropriations for the continuance of the Florida war.

JANUARY 21, 1841.

Laid before the House by the chairman of the Committee of Ways and Means, and ordered to be printed.

WAR DEPARTMENT, *December 17, 1840.*

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith, estimates from the Paymaster General, the Quartermaster General, the Commissary General of Subsistence, the Surgeon General, and the officer in charge of the Ordnance Department, of the amounts required to continue effective military operations against the hostile Indians in Florida. The Paymaster General's estimate embraces a sum for arrearages of pay due to the force of Florida militia, which it became necessary to call out and to receive into the service during the summer and fall, in consequence of renewed activity on the part of the enemy, and of the insufficiency of the limited number of regular troops to protect the citizens from the ravages and barbarities of those treacherous and blood-thirsty Indians. This pay is now due, and, as the troops stand much in need of it, justice to them requires that it should be paid to them at the earliest possible day.

This is the season for active operations in Florida, and, as the amounts heretofore appropriated for the prosecution of the war have all been expended, except some small sums under a few of the subordinate heads of appropriation, the department is now without the means of carrying them on. It is, therefore, of the utmost importance that further appropriations be made, with as little delay as practicable; and I beg leave to request the co-operation of the Committee of Ways and Means to procure them at as early a period as possible.

SIR: I have the honor to submit an estimate of the amount which will probably be required for the service of this department in prosecuting the war in Florida. Taking the expenditures of the year ending the 30th of September as the standard, about eleven hundred thousand dollars will be required for the year 1841; and at least two hundred thousand dollars, in addition to the small balance remaining in the Treasury and in the hands of disbursing officers, will be required to carry the department through the year, and for the payment of arrearages from 1835 to 1840, inclusive.

It will be remembered that, on the 2d of July last, I presented an estimate for six hundred thousand dollars on account of the Florida service, which amount I considered necessary, in addition to the balance then remaining of previous appropriations. That estimate I was required to modify and reduce to three hundred thousand dollars. On presenting the modified estimate on the 8th of July, I expressed the opinion that it would probably meet all demands against the department to the 1st of December. I now find that the whole appropriation will be exhausted before that time; and I respectfully ask that measures be adopted to obtain a partial appropriation of from three to four hundred thousand dollars, as early in the session as possible; and
