The PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE,
Washington, D. C., July 5, 1894.

SIR: The act organizing the U. S. courts in the Indian Territory provided that the judge should be allowed his personal expenses while holding court at other places than Muscogee, the act directing the courts to be held at Ardmore and South McAlester. On July 1, 1894, Hon. Charles B. Stuart, U. S. judge in the Indian Territory, asks that an appropriation be made to meet his personal expenses during the last fiscal year. His salary not being very large, he can ill afford to wait very long for reimbursement of his outlay. He suggests that an appropriation of \$500 a year would be sufficient.

2 EXPENSES OF JUDGE OF U. S. COURT IN THE INDIAN TERRITORY.

You are, therefore, respectfully requested to forward to the President of the U. S. Senate this application for a deficiency appropriation to cover the expenses of the judge during the fiscal year 1894, the same to be paid by the accounting officers of the Treasury upon vouchers rendered by Judge Stuart and approved by the Attorney-General.
