Mr. JOHNSON, of Louisiana, made the following

REPORT :

[To accompany bill S. No. 40.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill, introduced on leave, for the relief of Fernando Fellanny, report :

That Fellanny was employed by the United States officers as a guide and a hunter in the Florida war, and rendered important services to the army, and while so employed was badly wounded by the Indians ; which wound amounts to a total disability.

Not having been mustered into the service as a soldier, the law does not authorize the name of Fellanny to be placed upon the pension roll. Your committee are of opinion, however, that he clearly deserves a pension, and report the bill without amendment.
