IN RESPONSE TO

The Senate resolution of March 28, 1894, transmitting a copy of a communication from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, with inclosure, relative to the Indian agencies of the United States.

APRIL 9, 1894.—Referred to the Committee on Indian Affairs and ordered to be printed.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, Washington, April 7, 1894.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the following resolution of the Senate, dated 28th ultimo:

That the Secretary of the Interior be directed to report to the Senate the names of all the Indian agents, giving the compensation of each, his location, and the number of Indians at each agency. Said report shall also show whether said Indians at each agency are supported in whole or in part by the issue of clothing, food, and other supplies; whether annuity or other moneys are paid to them, and whether any of the Indians have taken lands in severalty, or are in the ownership of allotted lands. He shall also report whether, in his judgment, any of said agencies can be abandoned and the services of said agents be dispensed with, and if so, which of them, and the reasons therefor.

In response thereto, I transmit herewith copy of a communication of 5th instant, from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and its inclosure, containing the information called for, and saying that under present conditions he does not deem it for the best interests of the Indians to abandon any of the agencies now in existence.

It seems proper to remark, in this connection, that the Department has for sometime been investigating questions covered by the resolution, as well as other questions of a like character, but has not yet reached a conclusion upon which definite action can be based.

I am not prepared at present to recommend that any of the Indian

agencies be abandoned.

The foregoing is the rate of compensation for each agent when a civilian is appointed; but when an Army officer acts as agent, which is now the case for about one-third of the agencies, no payment is made.

The Indians who are supported wholly, or almost entirely so, by the issue of clothing, food, and other supplies, other than the Five Civilized Tribes, are as follows:

Referring to the last of the inquiries, viz, as to "* * whether in your judgment any of said agencies can be abandoned and the services of said agents be dispensed with, and if so, which of them, and the reasons therefor," I have respectfully to state that under present conditions I do not deem it for the best interest of the Indians to abandon any of the agencies now in existence.
